Pat Stevens Retires after 31 years

It was back in 1992 when Pat started working for the Municipality at the Digby dispatch service. She was part of the emergency dispatch team that responded to 911 calls and organized police, fire departments, and ambulances to respond to emergency calls. She also was on standby to assist first responders with additional services like mutual aid from other fire departments and Nova Scotia Power among other supporting services.

One of the more challenging aspects to the job was helping callers cope with the situation at that time and try to keep them calm and focused and get the important information that the first responders needed as they rush to the scene.

"It was a very rewarding and a

challenging job, helping those in need", said Pat.

In 2004 Pat left dispatch to take a position at the administration office in Seabrook where she

started a 19 year position as front counter clerk and executive secretary. She quickly became a fixture

with those paying taxes and those with inquiries. Pat always had a down to earth personality that fit the challenges of working with the public.

In 2006, Pat took the lead with municipal staff and organized the Municipal Relay for Life Team, The Millipedes, as she named the team, would participate in the relay from 2006 – 2018. The Millipedes were able to raise approximately \$30,000 in support of cancer research. This would not have happened if not for Pat's persistence and dedication for the cause. ***"It was a worthy cause and the team had fun during each relay"***, said Pat.

Staff will miss her positive attitude every morning as she would say, "good morning!" to each and every staff member as they arrived for work. On behalf of council and staff we would like to thank Pat for her service to the residents of the district for 31 years and for being such a great staff member to work with. Emergency Preparedness for Farm Animals

Make an emergency kit so you have emergency supplies in one location, and let everyone know where it is. Check and update contents regularly. Include the following items and personalize according to your needs:

Current list of all animals, including their location and records of feeding, vaccinations, and tests. Make this information available at various locations on the farm.

Supplies for temporary identification of your animals, such as plastic neckbands and permanent markers to label animals with your name, address, and telephone number.

Basic first aid kit.

Handling equipment such as halters, cages, blankets, and appropriate tools for each kind of animal. Include bolt-cutters to quickly free animals in an emergency.

Water, feed, and buckets. Tools and supplies needed for sanitation.

Emergency equipment such as a cell phone, flashlights, portable radios (with weather radio band), and batteries. The weather radio broadcast low frequency is 162.475 MHz, western region and local weather information at Hello Weather 1-833-794-3556 - Digby code 01020.

Other important safety and emergency items for your vehicles, like jumper cables, flash lights, blanket, first aid supplies, water and dry snacks should be considered.

Go slow and look low

There is one big bright side to the endless rain we have suffered through this summer – the mushrooms and slime moulds are putting on a wild and colourful display along our woodland trails this year!

This has been (and continues to be) the best year in a long time for mushrooms and these splashes of colour and bizarre shapes are a great excuse to go for a slow walk with lots of breaks to look and wonder at Nature's endless diversity. Identification can be tricky but I encourage people to make up your own names for what you're seeing. Or, if you just have to know the names, then try using the iNaturalist app (or Seek) on your phone. Go slow and look low and as always, have fun out there!
